With the coronavirus pandemic turning everything upside down, the 2020 Peace Interns are suddenly looking at a job that will be very different than the one they applied for. The Poor People's Assembly has been re-envisioned as an online experience. *It's Real - The 2020 Experience* has been indefinitely postponed. Regions are unsure what their summer camps will look like, if they are allowed to be held at all.
